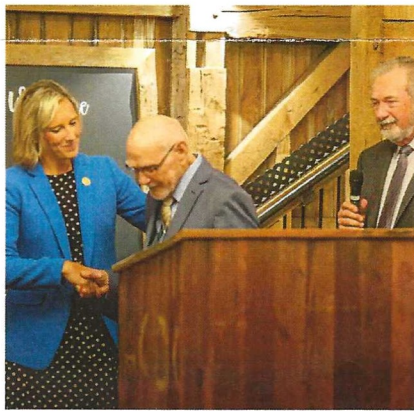

Community Health Workers Bridge the Gap

The Way Station has partnered with the Mahoning Valley Pathways HUB. This partnership will allow us to hire Community Health Workers (CHWs) who will connect at-risk families with healthcare and basic needs resources. The HUB program aims to improve health outcomes for expecting mothers, those with chronic illnesses and others by addressing barriers to healthcare access. CHWs bridge the gap between clients and social services by providing education, referrals and **advocacy**. They also perform risk assessments and monitor progress. Data collected helps track program effectiveness and identify community needs. One area that makes this partnership significant is Columbiana County currently has **no maternity delivery services**. All pregnant mothers must travel outside of the county when they are in labor. Another reason is Ohio's poverty rate exceeds the national average. Programs like this one that not only connects low income individuals with resources, but their advocate (CHW) ensures they are **taking care of their health** and making it to all of their appointments, countering the link of poverty to poor health.
