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Ministry information

Some people do not consider the indigenous tribes in the USA as an unreached people group. What we have found while working with the White Mountain Apache people is that most of them would consider themselves Christian but have little understanding of what that means. They do not understand what they are saved from or have a relationship with Jesus. There is much mixing traditional religion and other religions. AICM is taking the true gospel message of hope in Jesus who forgives those who repent of their sin and turn to Him for salvation. We are encouraging them to live godly lives according to scripture by studying the Bible with them and living life with them. We are praying with them for the Holy Spirit to heal and transform them to be like Christ.

Reservation Information

The Navajo Reservation is 16 million acres in size and there are more than 400,000 tribal members. The Hopi Reservation is 1.5 million acres in size and there are more than 18,000 tribal members.

The Fort Apache Reservation is 1.6 million acres in size and there are close to 14,000 tribal members.

White Mountain Apache Tribe Statistical Information

31% of the population are ages 0-14

53.1% of children under 12 years old live in poverty

The unemployment rate on the Fort Apache Reservation is 69.8%

There is one medical agency, and the number one procedure is detoxification services for substance abuse.

The number one cause of death ages 15-19 is intentional self-harm by hanging, strangulation.

The number one cause of death ages 20-64 is alcoholic liver disease.

White Mountain Apache Educational Information

In Whiteriver Unified District, 18% of elementary students tested at or above the proficient level for reading, and 28% tested at or above that level for math. Also, 7% of middle school students tested at or above the proficient level for reading, and 8% tested at or above that level for math. And 8% of high school students tested at or above the proficient level for reading, and 3% tested at or above that level for math. 23.6% of White Mountain Apache have less than a 9th grade education and only 34.4% graduate from high school.

White Mountain Traditional Religious belief

The White Mountain Apache still practices Shamanism, and it is Animistic in nature. Traditional Apache religion is based on the belief in the supernatural and the power of nature. Nature explained everything in life for the Apache people. We do our best to present the gospel message in a way that does not dishonor the people that still hold true to traditional religion but as an opposing belief that requires full submission to Jesus for the forgiveness of sin. Our goal is to be clear and uncompromising when evangelizing and allow the Holy Spirit to work in the lives convicting of sin and conforming to the likeness of Jesus. We strive to treat the Native American religious culture like Paul and the apostles treated different cultures throughout the book of Acts.





Reservation Outreach

The past four months have truly flown by. Now that I have gotten somewhat of a lay of the land, I have been focused on building relationships on the reservation. Building trust is a big part of developing relationships with the people we serve, and I do that in several ways.

We are given hundreds of pounds of food from Wings of Faith, literally hundreds of pizzas monthly from Little Caesars, and countless sandwiches and baked goods from the local Starbucks. I do not open the back of the van or set a table on the roadside with a "FREE" sign; instead, I have been packaging the food and taking it to the families' homes. I have established a friendship with the grandmother of one of our students. She has helped me in bringing food to homes in her community. Doing so allows us to share the gospel, pray with them, and love them.

On Fridays I typically ride the bus to take the students home to meet their parents and/or guardians. We meet them at the



"used to" because the reservation has cracked down on people loitering in front of the center.




To establish relationships with the churches on the reservation, my wife Trish and I have been attending Sunday services and community events at different churches on the reservation. Last October, I met a gentleman who asked if I was their new pastor. I explained who I was and why I was there. He told me he needed more than church services could provide. Long story short, we have been studying the Bible every week since. I have seen a lot of growth in him, and I am excited to see where God is leading him.

I am attending a men's lunch/study at the White Mountain Apache Christian Church on Tuesdays. I have established enough trust with the leaders to be able to give the message several times. I have also established friendships with several Apache men. Hearing their testimonies has been a blessing for me. We so often overlook how God

works in so many different ways.

Please continue to pray for the Reservation. The need for Jesus and the hope he brings is needed more than I can explain. Please pray that I am receptive to the needs of those whom God places before me and that I am obedient to following the Holy Spirit's prompting when He does so. Also, please give praise for all the good and wonderful things He has done and is doing on the Reservation. There is a lot of darkness, and it is easy for us to see only that, and we lose sight of the Truth; we need to remember John 1:5 "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

What's Happening in the Library?

Changes have been happening in the library. Since many Native American students have no exposure to reading prior to entering school, the library is an important resource to develop a love of reading. Many of our students are more than two years behind grade level and they don't like reading because it is such a struggle. They have been encouraged to find out what genre they are interested in and then helped to find a book at their level. This has begun to foster an interest in reading.



This school year has found a variety of changes to the library to encourage students to read. There are close to 10,000 books in the library and for students it can be overwhelming where to start to find something to read. The first project was to separate the children's fiction books from adult books and to label the books with reading levels. Students can then find books that they are able to read and it's not so overwhelming. The picture books were put in baskets so the elementary students could find them easier. Then chapter book series were put together and shelf labels were added to identify

the series.

Then, onto the non-fiction books. They too were separated and reading levels assigned. Using the Dewey Decimal classification, visual labels are currently being placed to teach children where to find categories they might be interested in. Monthly, books are highlighted by being placed on a special stand to draw students into checking them out. The elementary students come to a weekly library class where books are read aloud, and they create projects around those books. They are then placed around the library to represent that book.

In the beginning of the school year, they never looked at the chapter books or the non-fiction books because they didn't know where to begin. Now they are coming down and looking for specific subject books. Miss Florabel had most of them entered and now they are cataloged on the computer by subject, and we can find what they want. It has been especially exciting to see the middle and high school students spending more time in the library! The other day, three students came down and were reading the Bible together at the reading table. Several of the middle school boys have asked for specific subjects in fiction books that they wanted to read.

Future plans are to continue to make the library more inviting and comfortable. We have put up posters and also created a coloring area where students can come for a few minutes if they are having a hard day or experiencing stress. We hope to be able to get some bean bag chairs to provide a relaxing place to come and read. Reading is such a fundamental skill for our students to acquire and our prayers are that the library can be a conduit to them becoming lifelong readers.
